The Board of Trustees approved the Western Illinois University Fiscal Year 2024 All Funds Budget by source of funds and estimated object of expenditure on October 13th, 2023 (see Western Illinois University Board of Trustees Resolution No. 23.10/1). Per Board approval, Western Illinois University is authorized to spend up to \$209.9 million during Fiscal Year 2024, and the President is authorized to make technical adjustments in budgets if necessary.

Following the approval of institutional spending plans, the Western Illinois Board of Trustees shall receive quarterly revenue and expenditure reports to review the University's financial status and compliance with institutional spending plans. To be clear, concise, and transparent, the financials have been revised to a single chart that includes all sources of revenues and expenditures. This information has been presented in separate charts in prior years.

The table above outlines the approved All Funds Budget for the current year, along with year-to-date revenue and expense data. Fiscal Year 2023 data is also provided for comparative purposes. Revenue projections are based on factors including enrollment, retention rates, occupancy numbers, and other historical data. The budgeted expenditures are mainly comprised of personnel services, contractual services and financial aid obligations. Conservative projected revenues coupled with projected expenditure obligations result in a FY2024 budgeted deficit of \$19.6 million across ALL funds. Similar to last fiscal year's results (FY2023 realized deficit of \$13.6 million vs. FY2023 budgeted deficit of \$21.8 million), at this time it is anticipated that the FY2024 all funds realized deficit will be significantly lower than the budgeted deficit.

Overview

New student enrollment and overall enrollment is a complex interplay of a range of factors, including:

The enrollment challenge at WIU did not occur overnight and will not be solved overnight. The environment for recruiting and enrolling new students is very challenging. Competition is hyper intense, among other factors, for a declining market of students. This is particularly true in our primary market of the state of Illinois.

- Individual high schools and community colleges have the opportunity to bring groups of students to either the Macomb or Quad Cities campus to explore and learn about Western
 - The group visit calendar on the Macomb campus was full, including from Spoon River and Black Hawk Colleges, Havana HS, Pekin HS, Mercer County HS, United HS, Illini West HS and Limestone HS
 - A full slate of group visits was held on the Quad Cities campus, including from Alwood HS, Cambridge HS, Central-Dewitt HS, Bettendorf HS, Geneseo HS, North Scott HS, Pleasant Valley HS, and Rock Island HS (twice) as we continue to emphasize engagement with local high schools.

- Western Express brought invited, interested students along the Amtrak train route to campus for a daylong event. Students were escorted on the train by the Chicago-based admissions counselor team who will also escort the students during their day on campus. Students received various academic presentations, learned and experienced campus life in the digital recreation center, had a Multicultural Center presentation and tour, ate lunch in a dining center and met current students while touring campus.
- WIU hosted the Community College Transfer Articulation meeting on the Macomb campus. Each Illinois university may host one of these events yearly. This event allowed Western to provide academic programs and other updates directly to community college advisors.

College of Arts and Sciences

HIGHLIGHTS:

- Olivia Brinker, senior double major in Forensic Chemistry and Mathematics was selected as the Fall 2023 College Scholar. Olivia plans to join the MS program in Chemistry at Western after receiving her B.S. in December.
- History department faculty Tim Roberts and Ute Chamberlin co-created WIU's inaugural Future Teachers Day, which, co-sponsored with the School of Education, WIU hosted October 27, 2023. The event hosted 210 high school students from 11 regional high schools, and showcased WIU's various education degree programs. The event became paired with the School of Education's unveiling of its Seymour Center for Rural Education.
- The Institute for Environmental Studies and the IL Institute for Rural Affairs took leadership in
 establishing a memorandum of agreement with the Corn Belt Ports to support research and

Manure Grant Awarded - Professor Winthrop Phippen of the School of Agriculture was awarded a five-year grant titled "Manure to Bio-Char Nutrient Management on-farm trials". Dr. Phippen will be working with Quality Flow Inc. for this five-year \$900,000+ grant to study the effects of Bio-Char in managing nutrient management in production agriculture practices. It will start in May of 2024 and continue until April of 2029.

Livestock Center Facility Improvement - The School of Agriculture received a \$10,000 Compeer Community Building Grant to support an ongoing facility improvement project at the Livestock Center at the University Farm. This facility is one of the School of Agriculture's marquee facilities for recruitment and outreach events and renovations will positively impact the perceptions of visiting students. - Five students will earn their MA in Museum Studies in December 2023: Zackary Baraglia, Julia Gabbard, Mercedes Hynick, Alex Nasharr, and Lindsey VanDieren.
- Planning for an annual spring 2024 Museum Career Symposium for WIU Museum Studies students, alumni, and undergraduate students from colleges and universities throughout the region interested in museum careers and graduate museum studies at WIU.

School of Music



• The School of Music hosted several festivals and special events in the fall semester that welcomed thousands of people to campus. Over 3500 prospective students, parents, and community members attended the Marching Band Classic on October 21. WIU hosted the ILMEA District IV Festival on November 4, which attracted approximately 5,000 people to campus, including talented students, their parents, and

regional educators. Other highlights include the Holiday Festival of Choirs in December, Discovery Day for prospective music majors, and numerous guest artist performances in COFAC Recital Hall.

- The University Singers under the direction of Dr. Brian Winnie will perform at the Midwestern American Choral Directors Association Conference in February. The University Singers are one of only a few collegiate choirs to be invited following a competitive application process including hundreds of submissions from ensembles across 10 states.
- Dr. Alfonzo Cooper, Jr., and Professor Linda Andrews presented a recital on October 22 at the First Presbyterian Church featuring the world premiere of a commissioned work in honor of civil rights leader C.T. Vivian. The work, titled *Portraits of Peace*, was composed by Sharon J. Willis. The composer and two of Vivian's children attended the event.

Speech Pathology and Audiology

Our American Sign Language minor has become one of the fasters growing minors on campus. Clinic outreach continues to grow. Over 4000 patients in the last year. Additional support initiatives

Illinois Institute of Rural Affairs

A Governor's Executive Order signed in 1991 and reaffirmed again in 2011 describes the Illinois Institute for Rural Affairs as, "the State's academic clearinghouse for rural development data and initiatives." This executive order helps to define and guide the IIRA research, teaching, and outreach mission to promote rural community and economic development.

IIRA Research

The IIRA regularly publishes peer-reviewed articles, books, and technical briefs. The Rural Research Report and Rural Research Briefs are available on the IIRA website: https://iira.org. Here are several research briefs the IIRA published in the last three months.

- 1. Urban-Rural Differences in Mental Health Concerns: Findings from a Survey of the American General Population. This research provides stylized facts about mental health in the metro and the nonmetro and thus opens pathways for further research on the topic; survey data from the National Alliance on Mental Illness were used to gain insights into residents' perceptions / knowledge about mental health. Results of data analysis suggest that "mental healthcare" is a worrisome topic for more of the metro residents than the nonmetro ones. Furthermore, increasing federal and state funding for mental health care is strongly supported by metro residents, but not so strongly by nonmetro residents.
- 2. Exploring the Other Side of Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia: Informal Caregivers. This paper investigates metro-nonmetro differences in caregiving for sufferers of Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia. Based on the reasoning that caregiving is learned vicariously, for example, through observation, differences in both observer characteristics and external reinforcement were analyzed for both the geographies. Data are from the National Health and Aging Trends Study. Data analysis suggests that a typical caregiver is a female age 50 and above with a high school education. On average, caregivers in the metro work for longer hours, 6 hours per day in the metro compared to 4 hours in the nonmetro.
- 3. An Empirical Analysis of Financial Hardship Associated with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia: Metro and Nonmetro Patients. This paper explores financial hardships among ADRD patients using data from the National Health and Aging Trends Study. Results of data analysis indicate financial hardship among the non-Whites and the 75-84-year-old patients.
- 4. Beliefs about Dementia and Risk-Reducing Behavior: An Empirical Analysis of Adults Age 40 and Above in the Midwest, Metro versus Nonmetro. This paper uses microdata from the AARP survey on the Perceptions Related to a Dementia Diagnosis: Adults Age 40+ to explore the characteristics of Midwesterners who believe that they are at higher risk of dementia; both metro and nonmetro geographies were studied. Data analysis shows that 17% of the Midwesterners harbor the belief that they are at higher risk of dementia and intake of medicine to help with memory interferes with engaging in dementia risk-reducing behavior.
- 5. Cost of Dementia in Illinois: Metro versus Nonmetro. This paper explores metro-nonmetro differences in the prevalence of Alzheimer's dementia. Data analysis suggests that more nonmetro Illinoisans experience cognitive difficulties; dementia is less of a concern for metro residents, men, and for persons not enrolled in Medicare / Medicaid Programs; and Alzheimer's dementia cost is estimated at \$76.9billion.

IIRA External Grants and Outreach

- USDA-Rural Development Grant--\$200,000. The IIRA secured a \$200,000 grant from the Rural Cooperative Development Grant Program, which is funded through the USDA office of Rural Development. This funding will help the IIRA provide technical assistance to communities, farmers, and other entities interested in starting up consumer or producer cooperatives.
- 2. Cooperative Development. The IIRA provides technical assistance to communities seeking to start up cooperatives or to promote local food systems. The IIRA recently helped Sheffield, Illinois, open a grocery store. The Washington Post reported on this initiative. https://www.washingtonpost.com/lifestyle/2023/08/31/royal-super-mart-sheffield-illinois/. The IIRA will be offering a series of workshops in the region focused on local food production. The first workshop took place on November 28. Other workshops will take place on December 5, 12, and 19.
- **3. Economic Impact Analyses**. Eastern Illinois University (EIU) has contracted with the IIRA to conduct an economic impact analysis to measure the impact EIU has on a multicounty region in eastern Illinois. This is a follow up study to an impact analysis IIRA did for EIU back in 2017. The IIRA is also conducting an economic impact analysis for the Illinois Corn Marketing Board.
- **4. Strategic Visioning / Community Planning**. The IIRA is currently working with the community of Paxton, Illinois, to help residents create a community economic development plan. The local media is reporting on this community planning effort: https://www.fordcountychronicle.com/articles/featured/paxtons-vision-for-future-to-focus-on-housing-infrastructure-recreation-business-development/.
- 5. Business Development. The IIRA / WIU operates two Small Business Development Centers (SBDCs), one on each of the WIU campuses. The SBDCs provide one-on-one counseling for fledgling entrepreneurs looking for business planning assistance. The SBDCs also offer workshops and webinars. Recently, the SBDCs have offered bilingual English / Spanish workshops on digital Point of Sale (POS) systems such as square: https://www.wiu.edu/news/newsrelease.php?release_id=19538. The SBDC in Macomb is working with the City of Macomb to plan and host a business pitch competition in Spring 2024. The goal of the business pitch program is to invite entrepreneurs interested in starting a new business to participate in business planning workshops. Once they complete the workshops, entrepreneurs vie for startup funding in a "shark tank" like competition.
- 6. Governors Rural Affairs Council (GRAC). The GRAC is chaired by Lt. Governor Juliana Stratton. The IIRA has been a member of the GRAC since it initially convened back in 1989. The IIRA provides research and logistical support for the GRAC. The IIRA met with the GRAC and the Lt. Governor most recently on November 2, 2023. Through the leadership of IIRA deputy director Sandy Wittig, the IIRA created a rural development resource guide, which is a searchable database of all state and federal grant, loan, and technical assistance

programs that can help rural communities, businesses, and nonprofit organizations. The rural development resource guide is available on the IIRA website: https://iira.org.

7. Illinois Innovation Network. Chris Merrett serves as the Director of the Illinois Institute for Rural Affairs and Dean for Economic Development and Innovation. In his role as Dean, Merrett represents WIU on the Illinois Innovation Network (IIN) Council. Merrett serves on the IIN executive committee and was recently elected to serve as secretary on the IIN Council. Merrett and IIRA Deputy Director Sandy Wittig are on the IIN committee planning the 2024 IIN conference on sustainable development, which Illinois State University will host on October 17-18, 2024.

University Libraries

One of our strategic objectives and actions is creating services and resources that help our students' retention rate. The literature explains that students who visit and use the library stay in schools 85% more than others. In the first two weeks of the academic year, the traffic at the WIU Libraries increased 38% by October 2023.

The Center for Undergraduate Research is a collaborative project with the Centennial Honors College to standardize undergraduate research at WIU.

Thanks to this initiative, the Center for Undergraduate Research received a private donation and a donation from the Office of the Mayor of Macomb to establish a summer research program. These donations were thanks to Centennial Honors College's support.

During the summer, two undergraduate students will research under the mentorship of two WIU faculty. The research topics need to be related to local issues.

Jade Kastel received the Academic Librarian of the Year award from the Illinois Library Association. WIU Libraries is working with emeritus professor Fred Jones to develop collections about his scholarly and creative works.

Centennial Honors College

Enrollment Management and Recruitment

The Honors College continues to work with the Office of Admissions to effectively implement strategies to attract students to join honors.

The Honors College sessions during Discover Western events have seen an increase in the number of high achieving students who are interested in joining the Honors College. This increase in interest in honors is a plus for the university. The Honors Ambassadors regularly attend and participate in the Discover Western events.

The Honors Academic Advisors attended the Salute to Illinois Scholars event in Springfield, Illinois on October 10. They have since met with a student who attended that program. The student is planning to attend WIU.

Updates and Continuing Activities

The Honors Council and CCPI recently approved GH 275, a new experimental course for the Honors College. The course will be piloted during the spring 2024 semester. The title of the course is *Design Thinking for Social Innovation and Community Engagement*. This course will require students to assist a

company/business with a problem that they need to resolve. Students will be introduced to the basics of design thinking and human centered design. WIU will be among 6 out of 14 Illinois Innovation Network universities that offer courses focused on Design Thinking/Human Centered Design.

The Honors College and the University Libraries have collaborated to form the Center for Undergraduate Research. As a result of this collaboration, the Center for Undergraduate Research will be launching a scholarship competition for students to engage in research within and outside of the western Illinois region.

The Honors College is pleased to announce the return of Honors Convocation in spring 2024. Honors Convocation ceremonies are being planned for both the Macomb and the QC campuses.

The Honors College continues to work on a strategic plan and SWOT Analysis for the college. Focus groups are being held with the various constituency groups.

The Ad hoc team has begun its review of the honors curriculum.

Events

The Honors College hosted its annual Pre-Law Symposium on October 10, 2023. The keynote speaker was Illinois Supreme Court Justice the Honorable Mary K. O'Brien. The College also host several law schools for the table fair and a distinguished panel for the event. The event was well attended and the College received very positive feedback.

Planning is underway for the annual Pre-Med Symposium, which is scheduled for March 6, 2024 in the Brattain Lounge.

Center for Global Studies

Study Abroad

Fall 2023

6 students and 1 professor will be in Austria December 31-January 9 as part of "The Hills Are Alive: Austrian Culture in Today's World" faculty-led Study Abroad Course

2 students are wrapping up their semester-long programs in Japan and France.

Spring 2024

91 students applied for Spring 2024 faculty-led courses. There was a 91% acceptance rate with some applications still to be decided.

2 students will be abroad for the entire semester--1 in Sweden and the other in Italy

Summer 2024 and beyond

2 faculty-led programs are offered by Foreign Languages: WISE Mexico and WIFI France. Both are accepting applications.

Applications for individual programs in Summer and Fall 2024 are now open for students.

Spring or Summer 2025 faculty-led proposals are now open for faculty members.

Outreach

LIFE Fall semester has wrapped up. Thirty-six (36) courses were offered resulting in 577 registrants. Revenue in the amount of \$5,580 was generated.

There are currently 5 Sponsored Credit Courses taking place this fall semester.

Two Emergency Management courses with the Schuyler County Emergency Services and Lifeguard.

Three Educational Studies courses. Two with the Moline-Coal Valley Unit School District #40 and one with Beardstown CUSD #15.

38 student registrations. Generating \$30,985.78 in revenue.

The Western Connection has been open one Year as of October 20. Over the last year it has generated \$3,399 in revenue.

Report No. 23.12/8 -- Quad Cities Campus Priorities, Strategies, and Highlights

Guided by the Western Illinois University – Quad Cities Strategic Initiatives Plan, the following report illustrates the ways that Western's strategic geographic location and community engagement positions the University to develop impactful partnerships while also raising the profile of WIU programs and people in the region, the State, and beyond.

Museum Studies Hosts the Iowa Museum Association

The Museum Studies graduate program, though based in Illinois, extended its impact beyond the state borders by hosting the Iowa Museum Association 2023 Annual Conference, *The Power of Place* on the Quad Cities campus. One hundred fifty museum professionals attended, including 30 WIU Museum Studies graduate students, faculty, and program alumni. WIU Museum Studies Program Alumna Clare Tobin, Assistant Director of the German American Heritage Museum, received the Iowa Museum Association Rising Star Award during the Iowa Museum Association Annual Conference.

Career Connections and Employer Engagement

WIU Center for Career Development and Employer Engagement held the Fall Career Fair, with a 10% increase in the number of employers recruiting at WIU, and a 48% increase in the number of students who attended both academic-focused and all-majors fairs. For all-major events, the Career Center team increased its focus on educating employers about the international student population and brought in new employers to meet the needs of all programs.

Human Resource Management Program and the College of Business and Technology celebrated 10 years of Human Resource Management in the Quad Cities. Dr. Susan Stewart, Dr. Bruce Western, and others engaged and activated alumni and local HR networks for the event in collaboration with Alumni Relations. Audrey Adamson delivered a SHRM credit-approved workshop about Internship Best Practices to 30 human resources professionals.

Partnership for Innovation and Economic Development

WIU was featured in the Quad Cities news and on the radar of regional, state, and community leaders thanks to the leadership, initiative, collaboration, and expertise of Dr. Chris Merrett, Dr. Roger Viadero, and Dr. Honey Zimmerman. The Quad Cities campus hosted a ribbon cutting event to help announce a WIU/Corn Belt Ports (CBP) agreement that establishes an on-campus

office for CBP and program collaboration. CBP is a federally recognized organization that brings river commerce to the Quad Cities area and enhances the supply chain while also promoting healthy river habitat and water quality. The new partnership demonstrates Western's commitment to regional commerce and environmental sustainability, and even more powerful is the opportunity that this proximity brings to WIU for research, grants, and other support on regional and federal level.

State Representatives Halpin and Johnson, Rock Island and Davenport Mayors Thoms and Matson, Chamber of Commerce CEO LaDrina Wilson, and a number of staffers from both IL and IA state offices were in attendance (including Congressman Eric Sorensen). In total around 70 individuals including local media were present for the event. This level of coverage demonstrates to legislators that WIU is a valuable partner while also raising awareness about WIU programs and people. The event was planned by Audrey Adamson in collaboration with the Quad Cities Chamber of Commerce, Lexi Yoggerst and Sarah Ritter were there to document the story, and Zach Messersmith was present to interact with our government leaders.

This collaboration between WIU, CBP and all involved partners is possible because Western has a campus on the Mississippi River, and because Dr. Merrett, Dr. Viadero, and Dr. Zimmerman are entrenched in the economic development and environmental sustainability/river ecosystem scene, locally, regionally, and nationally. Programs in Community and Economic Development (M.S.), Environmental Science (Ph.D.), and Supply Chain Management serve as a critical asset and demonstrate Western's commitment and value to the region with legislators and industry partners.

Early Experiences through Educational Outreach

Western Illinois University's Public Media Service WQPT PBS welcomed over 3,000 people to the Quad Cities campus for a day of educational fun. Imagination Station volunteers included WIU staff members and students from a variety of majors and student organizations, such as Society of Educators/School of Education, Counseling Education, Engineering/Women in Engineering, SGA/Student Services, and Museum Studies.

Comments from participants illustrate the positive impression and experience young children and their families had while on campus:

- "The characters were the highlight for my son. The staff was super friendly and helpful too!"
- "The generosity of the whole event just blew my mind."
- "This event was absolutely amazing and we had a magical and educational experience. Thank you for bringing this to our community."

The Educational Outreach Department of WQPT PBS also continues its regular weekly events in the community, including First Book classroom visits, Adult ESL and GED prep classes, and presentations to Spring Forward and Stepping Stones afterschool programs.

In collaboration with Academic Affairs and Admissions, WIU engages with high schools throughout the Quad Cities region with program Open Houses, Western Wednesday events, and expanded partnership for early admission/dual enrollment with select high schools interested in

four-year pathways in high demand fields. In recognition of Western's partnership for special education, grow your own initiatives, and more, WIU was recognized as a "Premier Partner" of the Moline-Coal Valley School District.

Esports Arena – Local Venue for National Competition

The availability of the Quad Cities campus Esports Arena, combined with a tradition of team success at the national level, has positioned WIU Quad Cities Esports as an effective contributor to student recruitment, engagement, and retention. Quad Cities Student Services has expanded physical space to both the Quad Cities Complex and Riverfront Hall location, with enhanced gaming and technology capability. Esports celebrated a sharp new logo in collaboration with University Communication that evokes a sense of WIU pride and identity while also tying into gaming culture and design.

Telling the Story, Shaping the Narrative

Western Illinois University benefits from promotion and storytelling of activities and initiatives. The University Communication team promotes all Quad Cities campus events, partnerships, successes, and individual accomplishments through hundreds of published feature stories and press releases, promotion of Western's awards and recognitions, social media engagement, and marketing strategies that engage prospective students and the community. In addition, members of the team on both campuses regularly participate in outreach focused events held at the Quad Cities Campus and in the community. The Quad Cities community and media outlets throughout the region are watching and listening, and because of successful efforts to infuse WIU into local awareness, are increasingly embracing WIU and wanting to be part of telling the Western Illinois University story.



Resolution No. 23.12/1 -- Disposition of Closed Session Written Meeting Minutes and Verbatim Audio Recordings

Resolution:

- **WHEREAS**, the Board of Trustees of Western Illinois University must comply with the Illinois Open Meetings Act, 5 ILCS 120/1 et seq.; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Illinois Open Meetings Act requires public bodies periodically to review their Closed Session written minutes on at least a semiannual basis to determine what parts of the minutes should be made available to the public because they no longer require confidential treatment; and
- WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 2.06(d) of the Open Meetings Act, the Board of Trustees has reviewed the written minutes of the Closed Sessions held on September 27, 2018, October 3, 2019, December 12, 2019, December 13, 2019, April 30, 2020, June 11, 2020, November 5, 2020, December 17, 2020, March 25, 2021, June 10, 2021, September 9, 2021, December 1, 2021, March 10, 2022, June 9, 2022, November 30, 2022, March 23, 2023, June 7, 2023, and October 12, 2023, to determine whether the need for confidentiality still exists with respect to all or part of the minutes; and
- WHEREAS, the Illinois Open Meetings Act permits the Board of Trustees to approve the destruction of the verbatim audio recording no less than 18 months after the completion of the Closed Session; and
- WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 2.06(c) of the Open Meetings Act, the Board of Trustees has reviewed the verbatim audio recordings of the Closed Sessions held on March 10, 2022, June 9, 2022, November 30, 2022, March 23, 2023, June 7, 2023, and October 12, 2023, to determine whether the need for confidentiality still exists and whether to destroy the verbatim recording;

THEREFORE, be it resolved as follows:

- 1. The Board of Trustees has determined that the need for confidentiality of the written minutes dated September 27, 2018, October 3, 2019, December 12, 2019, December 13, 2019, April 30, 2020, June 11, 2020, November 5, 2020, December 17, 2020, March 25, 2021, June 10, 2021, September 9, 2021, December 1, 2021, March 10, 2022, June 9, 2022, November 30, 2022, March 23, 2023, June 7, 2023, and October 12, 2023, still exists and the written minutes shall be retained as confidential pending further review in the future to determine their eligibility for release.
- 2. The Board of Trustees has determined that the need for confidentiality of the verbatim audio recordings of the Closed Sessions held on June 9, 2022, November 30, 2022, March 23, 2023, June 7, 2023, and October 12, 2023, still exists and the recordings shall be retained as confidential pending further review in the future to determine their eligibility for release.
- 3. The verbatim audio recording of the Closed Session held on March 10, 2022, is approved for destruction.
- 4. The Board of Trustees will on at least a semiannual basis review the closed session written minutes and verbatim audio recordings.

Resolution No. 23.12/2 -- Update to Western Illinois University Benchmarking Institutions

Resolution:

- **WHEREAS** the Western Illinois University Board of Trustees initiated benchmarking for non-salary comparisons with the implementation of *Higher Values in Higher Education* and the establishment of University performance indicators; and
- **WHEREAS** the last update of Western Illinois University's peer groups occurred in 2015 (see Table 1, next page); and
- WHEREAS updated peer groups will provide an updated benchmark to help guide and support Western Illinois University in a wide variety of ways, including planning, program evaluation, and improvement in serving students with more contemporary peer groups best suited to the current context of the University; and
- **WHEREAS** the University will continue benchmarking against Illinois public universities where appropriate, and follow contractual agreements to work with the University Professionals of Illinois in setting peer groups for salary comparisons;
- **THEREFORE** be it resolved that the Board of Trustees of Western Illinois University approves the proposed peer institutions (see Table 2, next page); and be it further resolved that the Board commends the campus community for working collaboratively to advance benchmarking of the goals and priorities set forth in *Higher Values in Higher Education*.

Background

The Western Illinois University Board of Trustees initiated benchmarking for non-salary comparisons* for the Macomb and Quad Cities campuses with the implementation of *Higher Values in Higher Education* and the establishment of University performance indicators. These peer groups are used in benchmarking academic program review, accreditation, budget and resource allocation, student outcomes (graduation, job placement, etc.), tuition and fee comparison, facility analyses, student enrollment, retention, graduation, and other strategic plan measures.

Review committee membership included representatives from three Faculty Senate councils; Institutional Research and Planning (IRP); the Office of Assessment, Accreditation, and Strategic Planning (AASP); and Enrollment Management.

The committee was charged with the task of identifying a working list of 12–17 peer institutions to update the current list. To be identified as a candidate for the proposed peer group, an institution was required to (1) be a Title IV participating institution; (2) operate in the United States only; (3) have full-time, first-time undergraduates; (4) not offer only academic programs via distance learning; (5) be a degree-granting institution (primarily baccalaureate or above); (6) be a public institution (four-year or above); (7) have a Carnegie classification of Masters Colleges and Universities; and (8) have a student body between 5,000 and 11,000 students.

The committee began with a list of 31 institutions identified by the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) as being similar to WIU based on Carnegie classifications of public institutions of similar size. The committee narrowed this list to the 15 proposed peer institutions (see Table 2, previous page) based on the following criteria: (1) first-time, full-time new freshmen retention; (2) six-year graduation rate; (3) number of degrees awarded by level (undergraduate/graduate); (4) degree of urbanization; and (5) amount of distance education by student level (specifically, whether students are taking one course, multiple courses, exclusively online, or no online courses).

Institutions with outliers (defined to be top or bottom 10%) in more than two categories were removed from consideration. Institutions with only one or two outliers were not removed from consideration because these factors helped to provide a level of differentiation in the institutions being considered, while still maintaining similarity on the majority of relevant criteria.

Given that WIU is one university with two campuses, it was deemed inappropriate to continue with a separate list for each campus. Additionally, the committee did not identify a list of aspirational institutions, as they determined that Western Illinois University is able to have aspirational goals within the proposed peer groups. For example, WIU's usual graduation rate is 68%–69%, and the range for the institutions in the top 25% of the proposed peer institutions is 77%–81%. There is room within this metric to make progress toward reaching the top 25% of WIU's peer institutions.

Resolution No. 23.12/3 -- Amended Resolution No. 23.10/9 - International Union of Operating Engineers, AFL- CIO Local Union No. 399 – Landscape Maintenance 2023-2026 Bargaining Agreement

Resolution:

WHEREAS Western Illinois University Board of Trustees must approve collective bargaining agreements prior to implementation; and,

WHEREAS an agreement was reached on August 8, 2023, and was ratified on August 31, 2023, by the IUOE Local 399 – Landscape Maintenance

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Board of Trustees approves the agreement as presented.

<u>International Union of Operating Engineers, Local 399 – Landscape Maintenance</u>

An agreement was reached on August 8, 2023, and was ratified on August 31, 2023, for the period of July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2026, with the International Union of Operating Engineers, Local 399 – Landscape Maintenance representing approximately 10 employees.

Contract Language

The contract contains all the provisions required by law. In addition, it contains specific articles reflecting the unique circumstances of Western Illinois University. The parties agreed to update holiday pay, minimum number of holidays recognized by the University, overtime compensatory maximum, uprate pay for operating specified equipment, wages and effective date of agreement and update pronoun language.

Wage Settlement

The parties agreed to a three percent (3%) base wage increase for Fiscal Year 2024 retroactive to July 1, 2023. The parties agreed to a three percent (2%) base wage increase for Fiscal Year 2025 and two percent (2%) base wage increase for Fiscal Year 2026. The parties also agreed to a wage re-opener based on the salary survey.

Resolution No. 23.12/4 -- Resolution Authorizing the Financing of Technology Improvements

Resolution:

- WHEREAS it is hereby determined to be desirable that the Board of Trustees of Western Illinois University (the "Board") authorize the execution and delivery of an Installment Purchase Contract, and the issuance of Taxable Certificates of Participation (Technology Projects) Series 2023 (the "Series 2023 Certificates") in connection therewith, in order to provide funds to acquire an enterprise resource planning system to support the operating systems of the University including software, hardware and infrastructure upgrades, staff training, implementation and consulting (the "Improvements").
- WHEREAS the Board has authority pursuant to the Western Illinois University Law, 110 ILCS 690/35-1 *et seq.* to sell certificates of participation and enter into related financing agreements in connection with the financing of capital improvements; and
- **WHEREAS** the Board hereby determines that it is desirable to grant approval for the acquisition, development and implementation of the Improvements and to finance the Improvements and related costs through the issuance of certificates of participation;
- **THEREFORE** Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Western Illinois University in regular meeting assembled, that:
 - 1. The Board hereby authorizes the execution and delivery of an Installment Purchase Contract and the issuance of the Series 2023 Certificates in connection therewith, in order to provide funds to finance the Improvements and pay the costs of issuing the Series 2023 Certificates.
 - 2. Pursuant to an Engagement Letter, the firm of Chapman and Cutler LLP, Chicago, Illinois, be and is hereby retained as Special Counsel to the Board for all legal matters incidental to the authorization and issuance of the Series 2023 Certificates.
 - 3. Pursuant to the University's existing contract, the firm of Blue Rose Capital Advisors LLC, Chicago, Illinois, be and is hereby retained as Financial Advisor in connection with the issuance of the Series 2023 Certificates.

- 4. U.S. Bank Trust Company, National Association, Chicago, Illinois, be and is hereby authorized to serve as Trustee for the Series 2023 Certificates.
- 5. The Treasurer of the Board or his or her designee (the "*Board Treasurer*") is hereby authorized to enter into a Continuing Covenants Agreement with JPMorgan Chase Bank, N.A. (the "*Purchaser*"), and a Certificate Purchase Agreement with the Purchaser and the Trustee for the sale of the Series 2023 Certificates in a private placement.
- 6. The Board approves the forms of the Installment Purchase Contract, the Indenture of Trust, the Acquisition Agreement, the Continuing Covenants Agreement and the Certificate Purchase Agreement in substantially the forms that were approved in connection with the issuance of the Certificates of Participation (Capital Improvement Project), Series 2021, or with such changes as may be approved by the officer of the Board executing the same, his or her execution thereof to constitute conclusive evidence of the Board's approval of all changes from the forms thereof presented to this meeting.
- 7. The Board authorizes the issuance of Series 2023 Certificates, in order to provide funds to finance, or reimburse the Board for costs associated with, the Improvements, and pay the costs of issuing the Series 2023 Certificates. The Series 2023 Certificates shall be in an aggregate original principal amount not to exceed \$5,800,000 with a final maturity no later than 10 years from the date of issuance of the Series 2023 Certificates. The maximum interest rate on the Series 2023 Certificates will not exceed 9.00%. The final terms of the Series 2023 Certificates shall be approved by the Board Treasurer within the parameters set forth in Resolution and said approval shall be evidenced by the Board Treasurer's execution of the Certificate Purchase Agreement and the Continuing Covenants Agreement.
- 8. The members, officers, agents and employees of the Board are hereby authorized and directed to do all such acts and to execute all such documents as may be necessary to carry out and comply with the provisions of this resolution and with the actions of the members, officers, agents, and employees of the Board which are in conformity with the intent and purposes of this resolution, whether heretofore or hereafter taken or done, which actions shall be and are ratified, confirmed and approved.

Resolution No. 23.12/5 -- Amendment to the Regulations of the Board of Trustees of Western Illinois University Section II Subsection (B)(7)

Distinguished Service Professorship

Resolution:

WHEREAS, the regulations of the Board of Trustees of Western Illinois University allow the Board to act as follows when amending the regulations pursuant to Section 1 Board Procedures, Subsection A Board of Trustees: Authority, Paragraph (2)(b) states as follows:

Board action on the proposal shall not be taken earlier than the next regular meeting following first reading. During the interim between first reading and Board action, the President shall publicly post to the University community for comment the proposed revisions. Up to ten days prior to the Board meeting at which action is to be taken, members of the faculty, staff, and student body may submit their views and comments in writing to the President for distribution to the Board together with the President's recommendation for action on the proposal.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees had its first reading of this Resolution on October 13, 2023, and its second reading with final approval at the December 5, 2023, meeting.

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Board of Trustees of Western Illinois University make the following changes to Section II Subsection (B)(7) as follows (words struck through to be deleted):

Distinguished Service Professorship

a. From time to time, the Board may wish to continue to benefit from the abilities and experience of a resigning President. In such cases, the Board may, at its discretion, appoint that individual as a Distinguished Service Professor. The terms, conditions, and duration of such appointment shall be set by the Board. The salary shall be

comparable to the salary of senior faculty members within the University. Appointment to a Distinguished Service Professorship may, at the discretion of the Board, include a sabbatical leave provided the program of study or research to be undertaken by the appointee on such leave is first reviewed by the Board and judged to be in the interest of the University. If the appointment is made within a specific academic department, there shall be discussions with appropriate institutional and departmental representatives.

b. Persons appointed with the title "Distinguished Service Professor" to undertake teaching and/or research responsibilities shall be included in the faculty collective bargaining unit. Persons appointed to undertake other assignments without the title of "Distinguished Service Professor" shall not be included in the faculty bargaining unit.
