The Board of Trustees approved the Western Illinois University Fiscal Year 2024 All Funds Budget by source of funds and estimated object of expenditure on October 13, 2023 (see Western Illinois University Board of Trustees Resolution No. 23.10/1). Per Board approval, Western Illinois University is authorized to spend up to \$209.9 million during Fiscal Year 2024, and the President is authorized to make technical adjustments in budgets if necessary.

Following the approval of institutional spending plans, the Western Illinois University Board of Trustees shall receive quarterly revenue and expenditure reports to review the University's financial status and compliance with institutional spending plans. To be clear, concise, and transparent, the financials have been revised to a single chart that includes all sources of revenues and expenditures. This information has been presented in separate charts in prior years.

The table provided displays the approved All Funds Budget for the current fiscal year, along with the year-to-date revenue and expense data. Additionally, it includes Fiscal Year 2023 data for comparison purposes. Essential spending and important year-end deadlines have been communicated to the campus community to ensure that the deficit for FY2024 will be much lower than the budgeted amount across all funds.





## **SEO Audit**

Carnegie, University Marketing and Web Services partnered for the SEO technical audit which was completed in Fall 2023.

#### Objective:

Verify that digital marketing tactics are being properly captured within the GA4 account, properties, and data streams on the wiu.edu domain.

#### Outcome:

A set of findings and recommended best practices for a fully functioning GA4 set up and Property that will provide accurate and actionable marketing data. 






## Student Survey Results

#### How familiar are you with Western Illinois University's brand?




### On a scale from 1-5, please rate your overall perception of the University's brand.




On a scale from 1-5, how important is it for you to see diversity and inclusivity represented in Western Illinois University's




On a scale from 1-5, how likely are you to recommend Western Illinois University to a prospective student?



#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY OF SELECT ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

#### THE COLLEGE:

- The College of Arts and Sciences held its annual John Hallwas Liberal Arts Lecture in April 9. WIU
   Trustee Kirk Dillard gave a very well-received talk entitled The Value of a Liberal Arts Education in 2024 to an audience of WIU students, faculty, staff and members of the Macomb community. (Thank you, Sen. Dillard!)
- A ribbon-cutting ceremony celebrating the opening of the **Quad Cities Chemistry lab**, funded with a generous grant from the Carver Foundation, was held May 3 on the WIU QC campus.
- **Nursing Instructor Kaila Fox** is a recipient of the \$10,000 2024 IBHE Illinois Nurse Educator Fellowship award. The focus of her award is to enhance her knowledge about new teaching strategies in the nursing simulation lab.
- **Dr. Liguo Song, director of the Forensic Chemistry program**, and the Department of Chemistry hosted Hali Carls-Miller, a Forensic Scientist in the Firearms, Toolmarks and Footwear/Tiretrack division of the Illinois State Police Department's Springfield Crime Lab. In what is hoped to be the beginning of an ongoing relationship with the crime lab, Ms. Carls-Miller met with department and college administrators and made a presentation to students in the Forensic Chemistry program.
- **Dr. Peter Cole, professor of History**, was named an Honorary Fellow of the International Institute of Social History, Amsterdam, Netherlands. Dr. Cole also made several presentations at a number of universities in Paris, France on his public history project regarding racial violence in Chicago and his research on the labor movement.

- School of Agriculture Awards Banquet The annual School of Agriculture Banquet was held on April 17th at Park Place. There were 200 attendees at this event, which showcased student organization achievements, announced the Cliff Becker Agriculture Excellence Awards (which is new), announced "Outstanding Senior and Scholar", and recognized Dr. Keela Trennepohl as the outstanding faculty member within the department. It was also announced that the number of service hours accumulated this year by all of our student organizations was 3242 hours with Hoofn-Horn leading the way with over 700 service hours.
- Illinois Soybean Endowment Supports Research Several research projects will be conducted this summer, which were supported by the Illinois Soybean Association Endowment, by several of the School of Agriculture faculty and staff. They are: "Reading soybean sign-language with a multispectral sensor" (Gruver & Venturi), "Effect of foliar application of malic acid on seed and oil yield in soybean" (Phippen & Wesley), "Soybean maturity group selection and golden pennycress (Thlaspi arvense) establishment after soybean" (Phippen & Wesley).
- **Pennycress Celebration Scheduled** Wraps The 2024 Pennycress Field Day will be May 23rd from 10 am to noon at the university farm. This will be the final field day for the USDA-NIFA 10 million dollar grant that was awarded to Dr. Win Phippen in 2019.
- Weed Suppression Research Collaboration The Organic Research Program will be hosting a
  visiting professor from Italy this spring to study microorganisms' impact on weed suppression at
  the Allison Organic Research Farm. Dr. Mauro Senatore will be with us for about two months this
  spring.

- Ag Facilities Renovation Begins A renovation project has begun at the Livestock Center. The renovation project will include new flooring in the main hallway, main classroom, and bathrooms. New bathroom fixtures will also be installed for this project. The project was supported through the Ag Legacy funds as well as a \$10,000 Compeer grant. We look forward to the new renovation as it will give a fresh, new look to the Livestock Center that hosts numerous recruitment events for the School of Agriculture.
- IL Nutrient Research and Education Council (NREC) Research Continues In June 2023, Dr. Joel Gruver assumed the role of PI for a long-term multidisciplinary project titled "Integrating livestock grazing into the western Illinois corn-soybean cropping system to enhance farm profitability and reduce nutrient loss". The project, a collaboration between 3 WIU School of Agriculture faculty (Dr. Keela Trennepohl Animal Science, Dr. Graciela Andrango Agricultural Economics and Dr. Joel Gruver Soil Science) and 1 WIU Environmental Studies faculty (Dr. Roger Viadero Hydrology) has received renewed funding from the IL Nutrient Research and Education Council (NREC) each year since 2020. Dr. Gruver presented results of the project at the NREC conference in Feb 2024.
- The School of Computer Sciences hosted a Jeopardy-style cybersecurity competition on April 27, following the Discover Western event. Five teams participated. Based on successes we intend to expand and increase the number of competitions in the coming years.
- **SOET Advisory Boards Meet** Meetings were held by the four engineering majors within the School to present partial results of the ABET accreditation visit outcomes, review of audit findings, revision and update of educational objectives, and voting on curriculum and objective outcomes for all programs. Additionally, the Construction and Facilities Management Advisory Board met March 8, 2024, to discuss the protocols and tasks related to the initial stages for ACCE accreditation.
- **IGVC '24 Competition Participation** Engineering Senior Project Team Rock-E, best of two teams this academic year, will participate in the 31st Annual Intelligent Ground Vehicle Competition at Oakland University in Rochester, Michigan from May 31 June 3. Last year, the WIU team ranked 11 out of 26 teams.
- Career Readiness for Engineering Students Track I and startup of Track II of a S-STEM project to recruit and retain 20 (two cohorts of eight starting in Year 1 Year 2,

respectively) domestic, low-income, and academically talented students into its target baccalaureate of science majors of engineering and engineering technology. The program: improving Career Readiness for Engineering Students Through a mentored Living-Learning-Community (iCREST), started in the Summer of 2023 and it is sponsored through an NSF grant. Track I for \$750,000.00; Track II for up to \$2,000,000.00.

- **DOE Solar Technologies Grant Engagement** Application for a U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) Solar Energy Technologies Office (SETO) Solar Energy Evolution and Diffusion Studies 4 (SEEDS 4) funding opportunity. The program will award up to \$7 million for social science research that generates actionable insights that can improve large-scale solar (LSS) siting processes and outcomes for host communities.
- Quad Cities Manufacturing Lab Partnerships Revised Since November of 2023, the School has participated in the restructuring of the Quad Cities Manufacturing Laboratory, now deemed QCML 2.0, in partnership with the University of Illinois at Urbana Champagne and Iowa State University. WIU's previous operation in the Rock Island Arsenal is being dismantled and some of the equipment will be transferred to the Joint Manufacturing and Technology Center of the RIA as part of WIU's contribution towards the new partnership.
- Programmatic Exploration with John Deere Welding Engineering Technology Program - Since early Fall 2023, meetings between John Deere engineers from all facilities in the Quad Cities, School of Engineering and Technology representatives, and members of Blackhawk College have been discussing and weighing options to develop and deliver an education degree for employees, from Deere and other companies in the region, that focuses on elements and requirements in the processing of welded elements and assemblies. After many discussions and shadowing events at facilities, the determination is that an emphasis area, including 18 hours of special course, for the current Engineering Technology degree will satisfy the needs that John Deere pursues.
- National Engineering Week Engages Regional Youth 85 middle school students and several STEM teachers participated in a coding workshop in Riverfront Hall in Moline. They were divided into four groups to do a variety of activities, including hands-on coding activities and campus/lab tours (Electrical Engineering Lab, Maker Space, Machine Shop, WQPT, ESports Room, RF Atrium, and QCC Atrium). The event was coordinated and conducted by Engineering students, including the ACE officers. Participating teachers

expressed their gratitude and commitment to bring more students to events and activities of this kind.

- **GenCyber Summer Camp Planning** Begins The School of Computer Sciences has entered into a coalition with University of North Texas (lead), University of Nebraska Omaha, and San Jacinto College in an effort to bring a GenCyber Summer Camp to WIU in 2025. Continued participation in the DoD Scholarship program will ultimately allow WIU to participate as a lead institution.
- SCM Students Place 2<sup>nd</sup> in 2024 ASCM Midwest Gateway Student Case Competition The competition was co-hosted by UMSL's SCM program and the ASCM Midwest Gateway St. Louis Chapter, and sponsored by Bunge, Bayer, and Ameren. The schools that participated included UMSL, SLU, Mizzou, and WIU. This was the first year of this competition, and they hope to have eight teams next year. John Burton, Madison Butts, Devin Hermsmeier, and Edgar Sanchez made up the WIU team, naming themselves Rocky's Refreshment Co. The simulation-based competition focused on the impact of supply chain on broader company profitability for an orange juice manufacturing company based out of the Netherlands.
- WIU-SHRM Student Leaders Show Excellence at SHRM Council Summit The Society for Human Resources Management (SHRM) Student Chapter of Western Illinois University recently showcased its excellence at the SHRM State Council Summit hosted by the University of Iowa's Tippie College of Business. This event provided networking and ongoing learning opportunities for University students who are leaders in human resources. Throughout the event, student members of WIU's SHRM Executive Board made a presentation, engaged in discussions, exchanged ideas, and built valuable connections with fellow attendees from various institutions. The event provided a platform for sharing insights, best practices, and emerging trends in the field of human resource management.
- Supply Chain Management Program Hosts Second Annual ConNEXT Conference Western Illinois University and Black Hawk Region Pathways co-hosted the Supply Chain Management ConNEXT conference on the WIU Quad Cities campus in Moline. The event was designed to allow regional high school students to explore high-paying, in-demand careers in supply chain management and logistics. Supply Chain Management includes the business functions that plan, source, make and deliver. Attendees learned about different careers in sourcing and procurement, manufacturing and operations, distribution and warehousing, and transportation.
- Finance Students Make Stock Pitches MBA students enrolled in the Advanced Portfolio
  Course (FIN 575) presented their annual stock recommendations to members of the local
  investment community including representatives from Edward Jones, MidAmerica National Bank,

Wealth Associates, and the WIU Foundation including. The course is designed so students obtain a deep understanding of stock investing by managing an actual portfolio of money and equities. Analysis of companies' business models, growth and valuation ratios, price charts, etc., is performed before buying stocks that fit in a well-diversified portfolio.


Museum Studies is enthusiastic about the diversity of students enrolled and the opportunities

The guidelines were shared with the Honors Council for their review and vote. The guidelines will be implemented this upcoming fall semester.

#### **Illinois Institute for Rural Affairs**

- National Science Foundation Engineering Research Visioning Alliance (ERVA). Chris Merrett is participating in the Engineering Research Visioning Alliance (ERVA) to help plan research directions for the NSF, focused on rural resilience, technology and health. Chris will be working with colleagues from the University of Iowa, Cornell University, University of Nebraska, Missouri University of Science and Technology, and the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences. This project started in May 2024 and runs through March 2025.
  National Science Foundation Illinois Innovation Network. The IIRA is working with Honey Zimmerman, Professor of Supply Chain Management, WIU College of Business and Technology, on a National Science Foundation project focused on Smart Logistics. The overall project is called "Advancing Smart Logistics." There are seven IIN partners plus several private sector, governmental, and nonprofit partners. Chris will be participating with Prof. Zimmerman on a supply chain / smart logistics symposium at Governors State University on May 23, 2024.
- Value-Added Sustainable Development Center (VASDC). Sean Park, Kristin Terry, and John Bannon are working to address food deserts in Illinois by starting cooperative or municipally-owned grocery stores in Illinois. They are working with University of Illinois Extension, Chicago State University, and the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) as part of the Illinois Grocery Initiative (IGI), which aims to start new grocery stores in food deserts and help provide technical assistance to struggling grocery stores in low-income rural and urban neighborhoods. They are currently working Hopkins Park, Farmer City, and Englewood, Illinois.
- **Broadband READY Grant.** The IIRA is working with the WIU Department of Communication, School of Computer Sciences, and WIU Libraries on a \$75,000 DCEO grant to expand broadband utilization and digital literacy. This program has helped launch 10 Chromebook lending programs in partnership with community libraries in rural communities. The IIRA also worked with its broadband READY partners to co-host a workshop on digital literacy on the WIU campus on April 14. This was done in partnership with DCEO Office of Broadband and the Reaching Across Illinois Library System (RAILS).

• Illinois Innovation Network (IIN) and the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO). The IIRA received \$20,000 from DCEO to host two community planning sessions in partnership with DCEO and the IIN. The purpose of these planning sessions was help develop the next five-year economic development plan for the State of Illinois.

#### Recent IIRA Publications now Available on the IIRA Website (www.iira.org):

- Discrimination in Healthcare: Perceptions among LGBTQ Individuals in the Metro and the Nonmetro. Abstract: The LGBTQ communities in the nation report experiences of discrimination across many areas of life. This research explores the healthcare experiences of LGBT population in the metro and the nonmetro geographies of the nation. Data are from a national survey of adults conducted by the Kaiser Family Foundation and Washington Post during November/December 2022. The results show that the LGBT population is discriminated in healthcare; discriminative practices such as failing to treat the LGBT patient with dignity and respect are more pronounced among the nonmetro.
- Geographic Variation in Trauma Deaths in Rural Illinois: A Hypothesis about Trauma Deserts. Abstract: This paper explores the association between trauma deserts and trauma mortality using counties in rural Illinois as the geographical unit of analysis. Results of data analysis suggest the typical distance to a trauma center in rural Illinois is 14.5 miles. Further statistical analysis indicates that trauma deserts cannot be defined using the commonly prescribed "five-mile radial distance to the trauma center" criterion. A salient outcome of the research is the listing of distances to nearest trauma center from rural zip codes.
- Personal and Environmental Characteristics of People with Schizophrenia in the Midwest Region. Abstract: This paper explores the relationships between schizophrenia and demographic variables using data from the Medical Expenditure Panel Survey, 2021. The Midwest census region is the geographical unit of analysis. Statistical analysis of data indicates that the Midwest region is home to 542,537 persons with schizophrenia and although the majority of schizophrenia sufferers are men, the proportion varies among the races; the prevalence of the disease is higher among Hispanic females.
- Maternal Mortality in Illinois Counties by Race, 2000-2023. Abstract: The Institute of Health Metrics based at the University of Washington, School of Medicine, provides visualization of maternal mortality rates at the county level, but to gather timeseries data and analyze trends in maternal mortality one has to click on the visualization many times. This paper eases this burden; it provides maternal mortality data and change metrics for each of the 102 Illinois counties. Other than a listing of maternal mortality data by race, the paper provides several insights from the data such as: (1) The age-adjusted, typical maternal mortality rate in Illinois is 2.92 for the Whites, 8.89 for the Blacks, and 3.53 for the Hispanics, and (2) Cook County in the metro had the largest MMRs for Blacks and American Indian / Alaskan natives.
- Support for Healthy Eating and Active Living in Rural Communities: Insights from a National Survey of Local Governments. Abstract: This paper explores local government

policies that facilitate or support healthy eating and active living. Microdata from the "Community Based Survey of Supports for Healthy Eating and Active Living" (CBS HEAL)" were collated to gain insights into healthy living. Data analysis suggests that the nonmetro has fewer municipalities that require installation of dedicated bicycle infrastructure for roadway expansion projects. More than one in five local governments in both the metro and the nonmetro provide tax incentives such as tax abatement, tax credit, or property tax exemption to attract supermarkets and full-service grocery stores to their community.

## Illinois Law Enforcement Training & Standards Board

Founded in 1992, the **Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB)** Executive Institute provides knowledge and technical assistance to criminal justice practitioners throughout the State of Illinois, and is dedicated to developing leaders in the law enforcement community. Having been located on the campus of Western Illinois University (WIU) since its inception, the organization helps add institutional distinctiveness to the University as we are one of the few Peace Officer Standards and Training executive institutions in the country. As stewards of State resources, the Executive Institute continues to invest in strategic programs that deliver value and provide participants with academically-based knowledge and best practices. Core curriculum, workshops, seminars and executive summits are designed with fiscal responsibility not only for the Executive Institute, but also for those we serve. This quarter's contributions to the University community:

- The Executive Institute, one of the leading non-academic departments on campus, is currently managing fifty active grants this fiscal year.
- At every conference and training, the ILETSB Executive Institute either promotes WIU by means
  of promotional materials/flyers, verbal acknowledgement of WIU alumni in attendance, and
  collaborative efforts with LEJA, Psychology Department, Social Work Department, Management
  and Marketing Department, Philosophy Department, etc. Our name/branding is strongly
  associated with Western Illinois University, which further promotes recruitment/retention
  initiatives for the University.
- The Executive Institute promotes experiential learning through applied studies in external settings. These applied settings include internships, graduate assistant positions, and practicum students. We partnered with the School of Law Enforcement and Justice Administration to support the internship of an undergraduate student in the spring semester. Graduate assistant positions are also filled within the Executive Institute: Applied Statistics and Decision Analytics. The Executive Institute provides opportunities for student development and learning outside the classroom through involvement, leadership, and co-curricular experiences in environments that are supportive, challenging, and inclusive. We continue to support articles authored by interns and practicum students in our weekly newsletter. Additionally, the Executive Institute provides

professional development to all practicum and intern students through attendance and participation at conferences and meetings.

- The Executive Institute facilitated the course "Police Executive Role in the 21st Century," our flagship course sitting at three weeks in length, at the WIU Quad Cities campus with twenty-three police executives in attendance.
- The Executive Institute has been mentoring the WIU campus organization "Minorities in Blue," an organization that serves a wide variety of students who wish to pursue a career in the law enforcement field. Additionally, MIB seeks to encourage women and minorities to join the field. This purpose is accomplished through the organization seeking to motivate, enhance, and empower a diverse population of students to become leaders in the Law Enforcement and Justice Administration field by inspiring them to not only become entry-level professionals but also to lead organizations as executives and administrators.
- At the 2024 Women in Criminal Justice Conference in April, Director Hotz sponsored three
  members to attend the Women in Criminal Justice Conference in April, free of charge. We also
  highlighted the group at the day one luncheon, where the President of the organization
  discussed the MIB group at WIU. The group was given approximately 15 minutes in front of all
  attendees to discuss WIU and their organization.





• Director Hotz provided the group with a table to share information/make connections and highlight their spring fundraiser. Additionally, Director Hotz supported the spring fundraiser for the organization.



- The Executive Institute manages the Emergency Operations Center grant on behalf of the University. Staff continues to attend EOC project meetings with LEJA, McDonough County ESDA, Facilities Management, and Sponsored Projects.
- Continue to support research projects with Department of Psychology at Western Illinois University, as well as the Professional Research Pool for Criminal Justice Science (www.prpforcjscience.org)
- Barend Wurth, Program Manager at the Executive Institute, started as an adjunct professor in the Kinesiology Department this spring semester. He teaches the course PETE235 - Aquatics in the PE Teacher Program. This course teaches students various swimming skills and to experience and understand contemporary aquatic skills and safety issues suitable for instructing PK12 learners to participate in aquatic activities throughout their lifetime.
- The Executive Institute continues to use the UPM and Transportation Services Department for staff that travels to trainings, which for the previous quarter was nearly a daily occurrence.
- We have been a long-standing partner with the Center for the Application of Information Technology (CAIT) on campus, as they not only house our Online Learning Network, but also host our Help Desk and Part-Time Academy. CAIT also assists the Executive Institute with instructional design services, website development, and photographic and video needs. For the past two years CAIT has produced our keynote speaker introductions, which continues to receive high praise. The videos have even reached national level decision makers at the National Association of Women Law Enforcement Executive, who have inquired about using CAIT-produced-videos at their conferences as well.

#### **Global Studies**

- A record 324 international students graduated from WIU in May 2024; another 190 students are expected to graduate by the end of the calendar year.
- We anticipate additional students for fall 2024 with a focus on undergraduate enrollment, which will likely peak at almost 200 for the first time.
- Study Abroad continues to function with reasonable student interest; we continue to add sites and options;
- Outreach has a record number of attendees for the various summer camps. These are great seeding grounds for future students.

- The Office of Sponsored Projects continues to be busier than ever. Our pre-award specialist is experiencing a higher-than-normal level of proposal submissions and has many exciting proposals being submitted from various areas, interests, and faculty & staff members. Resolution No. 24.6/1 -- Interim President, Dr. Kristi Mindrup Employment Contract

#### Resolution:

**WHEREAS,** Dr. Guiyou Huang stepped down as the president of Western Illinois University, effective March 31, 2024; and

**WHEREAS**, Dr. Kristi Mindrup has agreed to serve as interim president of Western Illinois University beginning on April 1, 2024, until that time when a permanent successor can be named;

**THEREFORE**, be it resolved that the Board of Trustees of Western Illinois approves the following agreement setting forth Dr. Mindrup's conditions of employment while she serves as interim president.

#### INTERIM PRESIDENTIAL EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

This Interim Presidential Employment Agreement (the "Agreement") is made and entered into as of this 4<sup>th</sup> day of June 2024, by and between the Board of Trustees of Western Illinois University ("the Board") and Dr. Kristi Mindrup ("Dr. Mindrup" or the "Interim President"). The Board and the Interim President are collectively referred to as the "Parties."

#### **Article I**

#### **RECITALS**

01.01 The Board is an arm and agency of the state of Illinois and a body politic and corporate with its principal places of business in Macomb and Moline, Illinois. The Board was created by statute to, *inter alia*, operate, manage, control, and maintain Western Illinois University, 110 ILCS 690/35-1, et seq.

01.02 The Board desires to employ Dr. Kristi Mindrup to serve as Interim President of Western Illinois University ("the University") pursuant to the terms of this Agreement. Dr. Mindrup wishes to serve as Interim President under the terms provided herein. In consideration of the promises, releases, representations, covenants, and obligations contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration the sufficiency of which is acknowledged, the Parties agree to the terms set forth below.

#### **Article II**

#### THE BOARD'S AGREEMENTS WITH THE INTERIM PRESIDENT

02.01 <u>Employment</u>. The Board hereby employs Dr. Mindrup as the Interim President of Western Illinois University for a term commencing April 1, 2024, and ending when a permanent president is named and begins employment, no earlier than June 30, 2025. Dr. Mindrup hereby accepts such employment on the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

02.02 <u>CEO</u>. The Interim President shall be the University's Chief Executive Officer and shall have full authority and responsibility within the framework of the general policies determined by the Board for the organization, direction, and supervision of the University and for its effective administration and management.

02.03 <u>Duties</u>. The Interim President shall report directly to the Board, and, subject to the Interim President's Agreements under Article III, shall perform those services and duties that are consistent with the position as Interim President of the University, that are required of the President of the University by law, and which may be assigned to her by or under the authority of the Board consistent with her position as Interim President, including the following:

- a. provide general leadership for the University;
- b. make recommendations concerning the mission, scope, and organization of the University and concerning plans and policies for the development and enhancement of University operations and activities;
- c. Administer and direct University plans, operations, programs, and activities in the areas of academic affairs, administrative and fiscal affairs, student affairs, and public affairs and development;
- d. serve, under the general direction of the Board, as the principal spokesperson and representative for the University with the Governor and General Assembly, Illinois Board of Higher Education, and other external constituencies;
- e. develop and maintain positive public relations, including establishment of rapport between the University and the regions in which it is located and the public which it serves;
- f. make recommendations concerning the initiation, continuation, or modification of University programs and activities;
- g. make recommendations concerning the operating and capital budget requests, appropriation requests, and internal budgets of the University;
- h. make appointments of such officers and employees as may be designated by the Board; and
- i. perform such other duties as may be delegated by the Board or established by statute of the state of Illinois or by the written rules, regulations, bylaws and policies of Western Illinois University.

02.04 <u>Compensation and Benefits.</u> As compensation for the services to be performed, the Interim President shall receive the following:

a. <u>Base Salary.</u> The Board has offered the Interim President an initial annual base salary in the amount of \$300,000. At the Interim President's request, that amount has been reduced by 10% to support the University's financial sustainability. The Interim President shall thus receive an initial annual base salary in the amount of \$270,000, payable in equal monthly installments in accordance with the appropriate University payroll schedule. Salary shall include deductions for state and federal taxes and employee benefits. At any point during the term of this Agreement, the Board, in its discretion, may increase (but not decrease) the Interim President's base salary as set forth in subsection (b), below. In the event that the Board determines that an increase is warranted, such increased amount shall thereafter become the Interim President's base salary.

- b. <u>Increase.</u> The base salary provided for in Section 02.04.a of this Agreement shall be subject to such increases as the Board may determine from time to time. Any salary reviews may be based upon a determination by the Board during the Interim President's annual evaluation that the Interim President has attained substantial progress towards the satisfaction of the Interim Presidential goals/ accomplishments, which have been mutually agreed upon by the Interim President and the Board (or its designated committee) in writing.
- c. <u>Evaluation of the Interim President.</u> The Board is required by law to review the President's performance on an annual basis. The evaluation will occur in Spring Semester 2025, if Dr. Mindrup remains in position, with performance metrics to be determined at a later date in consultation with the Interim President and approved by the Board of Trustees.
- d. <u>Retirement.</u> The University will make contributions to the State University Retirement System on the Interim President's behalf pursuant to the schedule applicable to administrative employees of the University.
- e. <u>Insurance</u>. The Interim President shall receive health insurance benefits, life insurance benefits, workers' compensation coverage, and other such benefits accorded to administrative and professional employees of the Board that are authorized by law or rule.
- f. <u>Sick Leave.</u> The Interim President shall be entitled to sick leave benefits equal to one and one-half days per calendar month, which days may be accumulated up to the maximum number specified by the Board's Regulations, plus such non-cumulative days provided on an annual basis, as are specified by the Board's Regulations.
- g. <u>Vacation</u>. The Interim President shall be entitled to paid vacation consisting of two working days per calendar month, which days may be accumulated up to the maximum number specified by the Board's Regulations.
- h. <u>Office</u>. The Interim President shall be provided a private office, office support staff, and such other facilities and services suitable to the position and adequate for the performance of the duties of Interim President.
- i. <u>University Residence.</u> For the university's convenience, the Board shall provide the Interim President and her family and guests full access to the University President's residence during the term of this Agreement. The Interim President shall conduct such university business at the residence as she deems appropriate, including the hosting of official, university events, the catering costs of which, along with other reasonable, related expenses, shall be paid by the University. The Interim President shall review the nature, extent, and cost of any such official events periodically with the Chair of the Board.
- j. <u>Automobile.</u> The Interim President shall be entitled to an automobile for

University business and personal use. This automobile shall be maintained by the University. Fuel for business use thereof shall be paid by the University. The University shall be responsible for insurance coverage for the automobile. On a quarterly basis, the Interim President shall provide a record of the personal-use miles which shall be reported as income to the Interim President for tax purposes.

- k. <u>Travel.</u> The University shall pay reasonable travel expenses, hotel bills, and other necessary and proper expenses for the Interim President while she is traveling on University business, including the reimbursement of mileage for one weekly round-trip drive between the Macomb and Quad City campuses if made in the Interim President's personal vehicle. The University shall also pay the reasonable travel expenses for the Interim President's spouse to accompany the Interim President on no more than two out-of-state professional business trips per year.
- 1. <u>Professional Organizations.</u> The University shall reimburse the Interim President for dues and costs of membership for any professional or civic organizations to which the Interim President may from time to time belong. Such costs shall be reviewed periodically by the Chair of the Board.
- m. <u>Entertainment.</u> The University shall pay for or reimburse the Interim President for all official entertainment, the nature, extent, and cost of which shall be reviewed periodically with the Chair of the Board.
- Outside Activity. Although the Interim President shall devote substantially all n. of her business time and efforts to fulfilling her duties as Interim President, she may serve on two (2) outside compensated boards that do not compete or present a conflict of interest with respect to the University, subject to the prior written approval of the Chair of the Board of Trustees. Such approval shall not to be unreasonably withheld. In addition, other outside commitments (whether paid or unpaid) that may require a substantial amount of the Interim President's time must be approved in advance and in writing by the Chair of the Board of Trustees. The Interim President may not engage in any outside activity that the Board of Trustees reasonably concludes presents a conflict of interest or would otherwise materially impair her ability to perform her official duties under this Agreement. All compensation received by the Interim President in connection with approved outside activities shall be paid to and retained by the Interim President and reported in accordance with applicable tax law and University policies as they exist from time to time, with no effect on the amount of salary, benefits, or other compensation to which the Interim President may be entitled under this Agreement. By contrast, all honoraria, gifts, or other payments received for activities conducted in the Interim President's capacity and in the performance of her duties as Interim President shall be remitted to the University. Whether such standard is met shall be subject to a good-faith determination by the Chair of the Board of Trustees.

#### Article III

#### THE INTERIM PRESIDENT'S AGREEMENTS WITH THE BOARD

03.01 <u>Discharge of Duties.</u> The Interim President agrees as Interim President of the University to discharge the authority and responsibilities delegated by the Board. The Interim President agrees to remain responsible to the Board for the execution of the Board's Governing Policies and Regulations as they exist or may, from time to time, be amended. The Interim President agrees to discharge the authority and responsibilities delegated to her by the Board and to consult with the Board and such constituencies as are appropriate.

03.02 <u>Board Review.</u> The Interim President shall assist the Board in conducting annual performance reviews by furnishing such oral and written reports as the Board may from time to time request.

#### **Article IV**

#### THE MUTUAL AGREEMENTS OF THE INTERIM PRESIDENT AND THE BOARD

04.01 <u>Interim Term.</u> This interim appointment will begin on April 1, 2024, and will end upon the appointment of and commencement of employment by a permanent president, no earlier than June 30, 2025.

04.02 <u>Termination</u>. Notwithstanding the termination date set forth in Section 04.01, this Agreement may be terminated by any of the following:

- a. the mutual agreement of the parties;
- b. the resignation of the Interim President;
- c. the mental or physical disability or incapacity of the Interim President;
- d. termination for "cause," in accordance with the provisions of Section 04.03 of this Agreement; or
- e. termination or reassignment of the Interim President without "cause," in accordance with Section 04.04 of this Agreement.

04.03 <u>Termination for Cause</u>. The Board may, by agreement of majority vote of the full Board, terminate this Agreement upon written notice to the Interim President prior to the expiration of the term of this Agreement. If the Board terminates this Agreement for cause,

the Board shall have no obligation to pay the Interim President any salary or benefits after the effective date of the termination of the Interim President's employment, except any accrued but unpaid salary and benefits as of the date of the Interim President's termination. As used in this Agreement, cause includes but is not limited to:

- a. violation of any material provision of this Agreement;
- b. material acts of dishonesty or disloyalty in the conduct of the affairs of the Interim President:
- c. falsification or intentional misrepresentation of material information concerning the University's affairs, as reasonably requested by or under the authority of the Board, or failure to disclose to the Board material information concerning the University's affairs;
- d. conviction of a crime involving acts constituting fraud, intentional dishonesty, moral turpitude, or any other activity that materially compromises the reputation of the Board or the University;
- e. violation of any material policies or procedures, now existing or hereafter established, by the Board; or
- f. being under the influence of any illegal controlled substances while performing the functions of the office of President or conviction of any offense involving alcohol or illegal controlled substances and the operation of a university vehicle.

Provided further that, before termination for cause is effective, the Board will give the Interim President a meaningful opportunity to be heard, present written position papers, and present testimony and other evidence at a hearing called by the Board to consider termination of the Interim President's employment.

04.04 <u>Termination Without Cause</u>. The Board may, by agreement of majority vote of the full Board, terminate this Agreement without cause or reassign the Interim President without cause. The effective date of any termination or reassignment under this section shall be no less than thirty (30) days after the date of termination or reassignment vote. The parties acknowledge the provisions of Section 35-190 of the Western Illinois University Law, 110 ILCS 690/35, and 5 ILCS 415/10, governing severance pay. If the Board terminates this Agreement and the Interim President's position as Interim President without cause at any time during the term of this Agreement, the Interim President will be entitled to receive: (i) any accrued benefit time and benefits and (ii) last paycheck, in accordance with the University's normal payroll practices, equal to her then-current presidential base salary (less applicable deductions).

In addition, if the Board terminates the Interim President without cause, the Interim President shall be entitled, at her sole discretion, to join any administrative unit of the University that is

determined by the Interim President, in consultation with the Board Chair and the relevant administrative-unit head, to have operational need for additional staffing. In such an event, the Interim President shall receive the salary and benefit structure previously associated with such a position. Any such reassignment shall be consistent with the terms of Article 24.3 of the 2023—2026 WIU/UPI Agreement.

04.05 <u>Resignation</u>. The Interim President may terminate this Agreement and her appointment as Interim President by providing the Board with at least ninety (90) days prior written notice. In the event the Interim President resigns from the Interim Presidency, the Interim President will not be entitled to any further compensation or benefits as Interim President other than any accrued rights or benefits. During the period from the notice of Interim President's resignation through her last day serving as Interim President of the University, the Interim President shall fulfill her duties as Interim President and shall cooperate and provide reasonable assistance in the transition to a new University president.

In addition, if the Interim President terminates this Agreement under this section, she shall be entitled, at her sole discretion, to join any administrative unit of the University that is determined by the Interim President, in consultation with the Board Chair and the relevant administrative-unit head, to have operational need for additional staffing. In such an event, the Interim President shall receive the salary and benefit structure previously associated with such a position. Any such reassignment shall be consistent with the terms of Article 24.3 of the 2023—2026 WIU/UPI Agreement.

04.06 <u>Permanent President Named.</u> The selection of an individual other than the Interim President to serve as the University's permanent president shall be deemed a termination without cause and be subject to Section 4.04.

In the event that such a permanent president is named, the Interim President shall be entitled, at her sole discretion, to join any administrative unit of the University that is determined by the Interim President, in consultation with the Board Chair and the relevant administrative-unit head, to have operational need for additional staffing. In such an event, the Interim President shall receive the salary and benefit structure previously associated with such a position. Any such reassignment shall be consistent with the terms of Article 24.3 of the 2023—2026 WIU/UPI Agreement.

04.07 <u>Dispute Resolution</u>. The Parties agree to make a good-faith effort to resolve any dispute arising from the Interim President's employment or termination of employment in an amicable fashion.

a. <u>Mediation.</u> To the extent that any dispute arising from the Interim President's employment or termination of employment cannot be resolved amicably, the Parties agree to submit the dispute to non-binding mediation. Mediation shall be conducted within the state of Illinois by an experienced mediator selected jointly by the Parties. The mediator's fee shall be shared equally between the Parties. Mediation shall occur within thirty (30) days of the date of selection of the mediator.

Arbitration. If the mediation is unsuccessful, the dispute will be submitted to b. arbitration, initiated and conducted according to either the JAMS Streamlined (for claims under \$250,000) Arbitration Rules and Procedures or the JAMS Comprehensive (for claims over \$250,000) Arbitration Rules and Procedures of JAMS or its successor, except as modified herein, in effect at the time the request for arbitration is made. The arbitration shall be conducted within the state of Illinois before a single neutral arbitrator appointed in accordance with the JAMS Arbitration Rules. The arbitrator shall follow Illinois law and the Illinois Rules of Evidence in adjudicating the dispute and shall retain jurisdiction to oversee the enforcement of any award. Subject to the ability of the Parties hereto to vacate a decision or award under the Federal Arbitration Act, any decision or award of the arbitrator shall be final, binding, and conclusive on the Parties hereto and their respective affiliates, as applicable. The Parties agree to divide the cost of any arbitration administrative fee and the compensation of the arbitrator equally.

04.08 Section 409A of the Internal Revenue Code. This Agreement is intended to comply with the requirements of Section 409A of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended ("Section 409A"). Accordingly, all reimbursements and benefits provided under this Agreement will be made or provided in accordance with the requirements of Section 409A.

#### Article V

#### OTHER MUTUAL AGREEMENTS

05.01 <u>Notices</u>. All notices required or allowed by this Agreement must be hand delivered or mailed by certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested. Unless and until changed by a Party giving written notice to the other, the addresses below will be the addresses to which all notices required or allowed by this Agreement must be sent:

### If to the University:

#### If to the Interim President:

Dr. Kristi Mindrup Western Illinois University Office of the President 1 University Circle Macomb, IL 61455

Delivery of any such notice shall be deemed to occur on the earlier of actual receipt or tender and rejection by the intended recipient.

05.02 <u>Invalidity</u>. If any provision of this Agreement is adjudged to be void or otherwise unenforceable, in whole or in part, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Agreement. This provision applies even if, by statute or rule, part of the arbitration provisions of this Agreement are unenforceable.

05.03 Non-Appropriation. Obligations of the Board shall cease immediately without penalty or further payment being required if, in any fiscal year, the Illinois General Assembly or federal funding source fails to appropriate or otherwise make available funds for this Agreement, or if the appropriation is not sufficient. In such a circumstance, the Board shall notify the Interim President and the Interim President shall have the right immediately to terminate this Agreement.

05.04 <u>Professional Development</u>. The Interim President shall be entitled to expend up to five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) annually in payment for professional development activities to ensure her fulfillment of the presidential duties relating to the mission of the

University. The amount can be expended in the Interim President's discretion, subject to appropriate expense documentation being submitted to the Board Chair.

05.05 <u>Full Understanding</u>. This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding of the Parties hereto and supersedes any and all prior or contemporaneous representations or agreements, whether written or oral, between the Parties, and cannot be changed or modified (except by operation of Section 04.07) unless in writing signed by the Parties hereto.

05.06 <u>Illinois Law.</u> This Agreement shall be interpreted and construed in accordance with the laws of the state of Illinois, which shall be the forum for any lawsuit arising from or incident to this Agreement.

05.08 <u>No Assignment.</u> This Agreement is not assignable but shall be binding upon the heirs, administrators, representatives, and successors of both Parties.

05.09 <u>Disability</u>. The provisions of the Board's regulations concerning compulsory disability leave shall apply to the Interim President and this Agreement may be terminated in accordance therewith.

As of May 29, 2024, the Illinois General Assembly passed an operating bill for Illinois higher education. Therefore, the University's FY25 preliminary spending plan for state appropriated funds is presented at passed appropriation of \$56,826,500. This is a 2% increase from FY24 state appropriated funds.

The Income Fund budget reflects the necessary projected FY25 salary and operating obligations. In order to balance this spending plan with projected revenue for FY25, the University would need to identify further expense reductions.

Western Illinois University's *Fiscal Year 2025 All-Funds Operating Budget* will be presented to the Western Illinois University Board of Trustees in September 2024 and will include income projections based on fall enrollment.

Resolution No. 24.6/3 -- New Degree Program – BA in Public Relations

#### Resolution:

- WHEREAS, Governor JB Pritzker's vision for creating an economy in Illinois that works for everyone, *A Plan to Revitalize the Illinois Economy and Build the Workforce of the Future* (October, 2019) (<a href="https://dceo.illinois.gov/content/dam/soi/en/web/dceo/documents/illinoiseconomicplan2019-10-9-2019.pdf">https://dceo.illinois.gov/content/dam/soi/en/web/dceo/documents/illinoiseconomicplan2019-10-9-2019.pdf</a>) states, "A well-trained, diverse, and skilled workforce is key to attracting new businesses and helping current Illinois businesses thrive"; and
- WHEREAS, Goal 3 of *The Illinois Public Agenda for College and Career Success* is to "increase the number of high-quality post-secondary credentials to meet the demands of the economy and an increasingly global society", and Recommendation 3 is to "Increase the number of postsecondary degrees in fields of critical skills shortages" (https://www.ibhe.org/assets/files/ 070109 PublicAgenda.pdf); and
- WHEREAS, Goal 1 of Western Illinois University's Strategic Plan, "Higher Values in Higher Education 2022–2027," (<a href="https://www.wiu.edu/aasp/university\_planning/pdfreports/plansandupdates/HVHE-2022-2027.pdf">https://www.wiu.edu/aasp/university\_planning/pdfreports/plansandupdates/HVHE-2022-2027.pdf</a>) is to Enrich Academic Excellence, and Action 7 is to "Enhance and deliver accessible academic programming within and across disciplines"; and
- **WHEREAS,** the proposed Bachelor of Arts in Public Relations degree program is composed of courses from the Broadcasting and Journalism discipline and the Communication discipline; and
- **WHEREAS,** the School of Communication and Media was created by merging the Department of Broadcasting and Journalism with the Department of Communication (effective July 1, 2024) to facilitate collaboration between related disciplines; and
- WHEREAS, prospective students attending Discover Western programs who intend to become public relations specialists have frequently expressed their disappointment that WIU does not offer an autonomous degree program in Public Relations because they prefer a degree program with the Public Relations title, and have therefore decided to seek this degree at other institutions; and
- WHEREAS, there is a demonstrated need for a Public Relations undergraduate degree program in the region, and the public relations specialist field is projected to grow 6% faster than the average for all occupations from 2022 to 2032, as indicated by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (<a href="https://www.bls.gov/ooh/media-and-communication/public-relations-specialists.htm">https://www.bls.gov/ooh/media-and-communication/public-relations-specialists.htm</a>):
- **THEREFORE,** be it resolved that the Board of Trustees of Western Illinois University approves the Bachelor of Arts degree program in Public Relations as presented.

The Bachelor of Arts degree program in Public Relations is designed to provide an autonomous, dynamic, and popular major which is of interest to current students and has the potential to attract new students to WIU who may otherwise decide to attend other institutions. The objectives of the degree program are to prepare students who, upon successful completion of this program, will be able to:

- demonstrate a comprehensive understanding of the fundamental theories, principles, and practices of public relations, including its historical development, ethical considerations, and its role in society;
- acquire knowledge of the specific processes involved in public relations campaigns across various contexts and for diverse publics, including problem definition, strategy and tactic development, and evaluation;
- develop effective writing skills essential for successful public relations practices across diverse media platforms;
- develop skills in conducing both quantitative and qualitative research, along with data analysis; and
- demonstrate an understanding of the ethical principles and legal regulations governing public relations practices.

Western Illinois University currently offers an Advertising and Public Relations option within the B.A. in Broadcasting and Journalism degree program. The proposed degree program elevates this option to an autonomous degree program and focuses on the Public Relations aspect. In conjunction with approval of the proposed degree program, the existing option will enter phase-out.

Students who wish to be admitted to the Bachelor of Arts degree program in Public Relations must satisfy the standards for admission to Western Illinois University. The degree program requires students to complete 120 semester hours, including 33 s.h. of core courses and 9 s.h. of directed electives.

Initially, this degree program will be offered at the Macomb campus as a face-to-face program. Growth opportunities to expand to the Quad Cities campus and/or an online offering will be re-evaluated when staffing levels are sufficient to merit such consideration.

The degree program will be administered by the newly formed School of Communication and Media within the College of Fine Arts and Communication. It is anticipated that 10 students will enroll in the degree program during its first year of operation. By the fifth year of operation, the program is anticipated to grow to approximately 25 program majors with 8 degrees awarded annually.
