Special Programs on Campus

Degrees in political science have certainly taken our alumni to many fascinating places all over the world, but have you ever visited Greenwich Village...in 1913? How about France during the revolution, the infamous 1969 Democratic National Convention, or the negotiations to build a new South Africa after the fall of apartheid? Thanks to Reacting to the Past, a series of elaborate simulations developed at Barnard College, WIU students now have the opportunity to gain practical political experience by roleplaying a political actor at a pivotal moment for democracy. A summer stipend awarded by the Western Illinois University Foundation gave political science professor Dr. Erin Taylor the opportunity to travel to the Reacting to the Past Faculty Institute at Barnard College to learn how to teach with Reacting games. Students now have the chance to experience four different simulations offered in Dr. Taylor's introductory American Government course, her

upper-division American Political Thought course, and in the honors course "The Democracy Games," and plans are currently in the works to add a fifth simulation to the capstone Senior Seminar. A generous gift from political science alum Dale Johnson (1971), and his wife Lynn (1971) also made it possible for the department to create a flexible classroom space with rolling tables and chairs to allow Dr. Taylor to rearrange the room into different configurations for playing the games. Students' reactions to the simulations have been overwhelmingly positive, with many reporting that Reacting is unlike anything they've experienced in their educational careers. The Political Science department is proud to continue its tradition of offering unique opportunities for experiential learning, and we're so grateful to the WIU alumni whose contributions help us to bring these opportunities to our students.

The department would like to express gratitude for the unfaltering leadership of our outgoing chair, Dr. Keith Boeckelman. Boeckelman took the helm of rthe POLS department in 2010, serving as interim chair. A few years later, after a national search, Dr. B was selected to fill the position as the bona fide chair, where he has served since. Under his leadership, Prof. Boeckelman oversaw the tenure and or promotion of his junior colleagues, secured joint degree opportunities with nearby law schools, facilitated the creation of the department's Dan and Laura Webb Professorship, and spent countless hours recruiting students to our program. In addition, Dr. B remained an active scholar, presenting and publishing research papers including his most recent article which appears in one of the most recent article which appears in one of the most prestigious journals for state politics scholars, State and Local Government Review. Dr. Albarracin' recent scholarship includes Co-authorship on a book examining the determinants of holding conspiratorial beliefs about government and society. Additionally, she has published influential books on topics related to immigration and comparative politics in the last few years. Impressively, Dr. Albarracin not only manages to be among the most productive scholars on campus but also directs a non profit organization (Western Illinois Dreamers) providing utility assistance, scholarship assistance, and networking opportunities for undocumented residents of the area and students. Major Faculty and Staff Achievements: Political science faculty have been active in community outreach, including frequent media appearances. For example, members several faculty participated in the Western Illinois Museum's "Taking Questions" discussion series, including: Rick Hardy on The Supreme Court in historical perspective, Julia Albarracin on Latinx immigration, and Keith Boeckelman on impeachment and its history. Keith Boeckelman along with political science graduate student Delilah Sanders and student legal counsel Victoria Smith participated in the Constitution Day event on the right to vote, which was broadcast on Channel 3 beginning in September. In terms of media appearances, Keith Boeckelman appeared on KHQA news, to discuss the Georgia runoff elections and the Electoral College. Keith Boeckelman also did a video interview with the Quad City Times to discuss the January 6

riots in the U.S. capitol. Casey LaFrance appeared on the podcast "Real Time," sponsored by the Illinois Public Employer Labor Relations Association to discuss aligning policing with the community. Greg Baldi appeared on Channel 3 to discuss the 20th Anniversary of 9/11. Vin Auger was interviewed for the Burlington Hawkeye about the situation in Afghanistan in September. Gregory Baldi participated in the Panel Discussion on Ukraine in March. Julia Albarracin is the Distinguished Faculty Lecturer for Spring '22.
