COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The goal of AGRI 220 is to introduce students to agricultural management concepts and the general knowledge base needed to run a small profit-oriented agribusiness in today's competitive environment.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

The course serves as an opportunity for students:

1. To develop a basic understanding of agribusiness principles and apply them in addressing agricultural issues.
2. To understand agriculture in the U.S. and world economies.
3. To improve the ability to think critically and articulate responsible decision-making by using graphical and quantitative tools to address economic problems.
4. To be exposed to the socioeconomic aspects of public policy issues regarding the agricultural/rural sector.

EXPECTATIONS OF STUDENTS:

Participation/ Attendance & Sitting Chart: Attendance is required and will be graded through Kahoot! Quizzes. Students' participation in class is strongly encouraged. Students are expected to read the chapter and activities assigned each week – see the course outline at the end of this document.

EXAMS:

There will be 3 midterms and one final exam. Exams include True/False, fill-in-the-blank, matching, multiple-choice, open-ended, and/or problem-solving questions. **The final exam will be comprehensive** (same format as semester exams) but longer. Make-up exams will only be given in extreme situations.

HOMEWORK AND CLASS EXERCISE:

Homework will focus on understanding key concepts, heavily relying on graphing and problem-solving. I strongly encourage you to work independently before checking your answers with your classmates. You will have one assignment related to each chapter and/or **reading related to that chapter**. Late assignments will be docked 10% per day and will not be accepted after the assignment key has been uploaded on Western Online or the rest of the students have received their homework graded.

Readings related to the chapter being covered will be uploaded on Western Online. I aim to use these readings to help you understand the principles covered in class and link them to real-life situations. Questions related to the reading will be in the assignments, quizzes, and/or exams.

Class exercises will reinforce your understanding of each topic, primarily calculations. I will provide you with a problem to work on during class. To solve the problem, you can use your notes, work with a classmate, and/or ask the instructor. **Class exercises must be submitted immediately after the class session. No submission of a class exercise will be reported as a zero.**

WEEKLY IN-CLASS QUIZZES:

Ten-point quizzes on lectures, readings, and/or other references – True/False, fill-in-the-blank, multiple choice, essay, and/or problem-solving questions will be **scheduled each Friday**. There will be no makeups, no taking the quizzes early or coming to class late to take quizzes. The lowest score quiz will be dropped. **Suppose a student has an official excused absence in writing (illness, judging team, etc.) reported before class starts. In that case, the student is responsible for working with the instructor to arrange to take the quiz before class starts on Monday. Quizzes not completed after the following Monday will be reported as a zero.** The instructor reserves the right to 1) use both announced and unannounced quizzes and 2) drop the lowest in-class quiz grade at the end of the semester, provided the student has not missed any quiz.

Kahoot! quizzes will be based on lectures, readings, and/or other references. We will use True/False, fill-in-the-blank, multiple choice, and open-ended questions format. Kahoot! quizzes will be used during class to reinforce your understanding of the many concepts we will cover in AGRI 220. **No participation in Kahoot! quizzes will be reported as a zero.**
