Multicultural Center Breaks Ground at Western

WIU is in the beginning stage of building a new Multicultural Center on campus on the site where the old CASA Latina building used to stand. The new Multicultural Center will house the Women's Center, CASA Latina, Gwendolyn Brooks Cultural Center, and the International Friendship Club. However, what marks this building as different is that it will be built under completely "green" standards, including a grass roof, which has a 40 year life span and will include grasses native to Illinois. Other standards that will make this new structure "green" are a geothermal system, the use of en-

ergy efficient fluorescent lighting, building with recyclable materials, such as bamboo flooring, and by not building a parking structure, which encourages pedestrian traffic as well as the use of public transportation.

Ground breaking for the new Cultural Center took Place on September 28, 2007, with construction beginning in October. The main floor of the building will be comprised of four lounges, a computer lab, and a dance theater area. However, the second floor of the new structure will be filled with three office suites, housing each of the three offices moving to the new center, as well as two group study areas and a library lined atrium

This new center will impact CSP as two of the current directors, Janine Cavicchia, of the Women's Center, and Belinda Carr, of Gwendolyn Brooks Cultural Center, are graduates of WIU's CSP program. Also, this new center will enrich the experiences of many current and future CSP students. The three centers offer a number of assistantships, currently held by Rebecca Groves in the Women's Center and Elizabeth Boucek in Casa Latina, as well as practica opportunities for CSP students like Julia Pond in the Women's Center

Completion of this project is slated for November of 2008.
