Agenda:

- A. Review meeting minutes from March 1, 2024
 - a. Minutes are in the Google folder.
- B. IBHE Equity Plan Data Discussion Webinar takeaways from the March 14 webinar
 - a. This is the inaugural plan. The IBHE does not have all of the state information available for the plans. They have shared a report, a later distributed version of the Big Picture. The Big Picture is in the ARTF Google Drive.
 - b. Not all institutions have received the Equity Plan framework. Not all institutions have the same access to requested institutional data.
 - c. Some institutions have tied their plan to their longer-range institutional plans. Because the Equity Plan is reviewed every year, they will note progress on their plan annually.
 - d. Over the summer the IBHE will review the plans from the universities and provide feedback.
 - e. The deadline remains May 31, 2024.
 - f. To help increase understanding of what data is requested, a dictionary of definitions will be sent to institutions
 - g. Instead of writing each diversity statement on campus, some institutions are writing the university statement followed by a list of offices that have a statement.
- C. Request for data Updates
 - a. HR (Andrea) No additional information to report.
 - b. Admissions (Lorette & Carl met with Doug Freed on March 5)
 - Recruitment is the focus. Other offices take over once the students are on campus. Admissions is a member of the Chicago Public Schools (CPS) affiliated programs - Chicago Compact, Chicago Scholar, and Hope Chicago. WIU pays to be part of Chicago Scholars.
 - ii. Admission counselors are assigned territories across the state from which to recruit students. 3 are dedicated to Chicago and St. Louis.
 - iii. Last fall more than 50% of the incoming students were of the minoritized population. Will continue to target diverse students.
 - iv. There is no Admission Office DEI statement. The office relies on the overall WIU statement
 - v. Definitions
 - 1. Adult Student: Being over age 24 or independent
 - 2. Low-Income student: Pell eligible
 - 3. Local students are considered rural
 - c. Registrar (Carl & Lorette met with Sarah Lawson on March 5)
 - Registrar's contact with students is limited. Connection is through mass email announcements about reapplying and when students are close to earning their degree
 - ii. Data on students can be obtained from Sue Thorman, IRP Info
 Technology Technical Associate, who will be a knowledgeable resource if

- Christopher Pynes, the new Director of IRP, does not know something the ARTF may need
- iii. The office is working with Justin Schuch to reinstate "Stop Out". Stop Out will allow a person left WIU with 90 or more credit hours to come back to complete their degree
- iv. Does not know of policies that create barriers to equity.
- v. Definitions
 - 1. Rural Student: the definition is not yet available. Not always zip code. He will explore
 - 2. Low-Income student: Pell eligible
 - 3. Completion and Graduation: "completion" could mean receipt of a certification while "graduation" means receiving a degree.
- d. Institutional Research and Planning (Lorette & Carl met with Christopher Pynes on March 8)
 - i. A review of the state legal statement (110 ILCS 205/9.16) listed on the IBHE Equity Plan Framework shows that women and a number of other identities are included in the list of the underrepresented.
 - ii. The Fact Book provides information on ethnicity, graduation, retention and so on. If something is needed that is not in the Fact Book please ask Christopher exactly what is needed
 - iii. Recommends contacting DPS for a spiral-bound copy of the Fact Book. They can create one at a cost for whoever wants one
 - iv. A Fact Books for a selected year can be found at https://www.wiu.edu/irp/factbook.php
 - v. Definitions
 - 1. Rural Student: the definition is not yet available. Not always zip code. He will explore
 - 2. Low-Income student: Pell eligible
 - 3. Students with disabilities would list those accommodated, not those with disabilities.
 - 4. Completion and graduation. Christopher was not certain however, he offered the idea that "completion" could mean how long it takes to complete a program or degree while "graduation" means receiving a degree.
- e. Climate Survey Results Lorette stated that following the addition of acknowledgements to Drs. Jeremy Robinett and Craig Tollini for their work on the report and the correction of a date in the survey. It lists the survey having taken place in fall 2023 when it took place in spring 2023.
