The Purpose and Operation of LIFE

Promoting Self-Growth/Building Community

LIFE (Learning Is ForEver) is affiliated with the Road Scholar Elderhostel Institute Network, a national organization of over 150 similar groups devoted to adult education. In the Macomb area, LIFE is sponsored by Western Illinois University. However, it is a self directed organization, composed of retired and semi-retired area residents who develop courses, select the teachers, establish the fees, and promote the curriculum. Now in its third decade, the LIFE organization is dedicated to providing high-quality, enjoyable educational experiences for very modest fees. The teachers and activity leaders are not paid, but they are all highly competent, engaging, and friendly members of the community who are committed to sharing the joy of lifelong learning.

Any adult is welcome to register for a LIFE course. There are no educational requirements, or any prerequisites or exams. All anyone needs is an interest in sharing an educational experience. The class is commonly a mixture of people with varied backgrounds who want to remain intellectually stimulated, learn new skills, or participate in a cultural event—and probably make new friends in the process. Every class functions in an informal, noncompetitive way, fostering lively engagement with the topic and an enjoyable experience. Designed to be stimulating and fun, the LIFE program provides recreational education and champions the cause of lifelong learning in the Macomb area.

Course Costs

Course costs are based upon the number of hours in a course as listed below:

- 1-2 hour class......\$5
- 2.1-4 hour class.....\$10
- 4.1-6 hour class.....\$15
- 6.1 hours or more\$20

In addition, course costs may include course-specific costs (e.g., food, travel, course materials, etc.).

If you have provided us with an email address, that will be our primary form of communication. Please monitor it daily. <u>Please read the LIFE Refund and Waitlist Policies closely.</u>

Refund Policy

- Requests to withdraw from a class must be received 14 days before the first class meeting
 in order to receive a refund. All approved refunds will be issued at the end of the semester.
- Requests to withdraw from a class received less than 14 days prior to the first class meeting
 will be issued an in-house credit to be used for a LIFE course from either the current or
 next semester. If the credit does not get used in either the current or next semester, it will
 be absorbed by the LIFE organization for future programming costs.
- Those owed a refund will receive a check directly from WIU.
- Those who have paid for a class that is canceled by LIFE, or who are waitlisted and no space becomes available, will be refunded at the end of the semester.

Refund Policy (specific to registrations paid for via credit card or online)

- Any payment made using a credit card accrues a credit card transaction fee.
- If a course is canceled by LIFE or a LIFE instructor, the full course registration cost, including the transaction fee, will be refunded at the end of the semester.

Astrophotography Through a Telescope - Imaging Space

Our universe is full of beautiful and interesting objects to view and to take images of. Discover how we amateur photographers create magnificent images of our solar system and even distant galaxies millions of light years away. Each year I travel to dark sites across the country, imaging space gems that most people never get to see. The course will cover telescopic and camera equipment I use in the process, along with the computer software I use to stack and process multiple photos into one beautiful image. You do not need a telescope to benefit from this class; you only need a passing interest in astronomy and a desire to explore the wonders space has to offer. Come enjoy my images of our sun, moon, eclipses, star clusters, nebulae, and galaxies.

The Frontier Experience in Western Illinois

Most of the counties in western Illinois were established 200 years ago. That promoted the coming of settlers, the creation of communities, and the struggle with harsh conditions that lasted until the 1850s. This two-hour class will introduce participants to historical materials that reflect the earliest generations (1820s-1850s) here – including maps, drawings, photographs, records, and personal accounts. Those will depict the creation of counties, the development of homes and farms, the founding of small villages, and the challenges that made frontier life so difficult. The focus will be on everyday experiences rather than noted individuals and events, and it will be a fascinating introduction to the vast array of materials available to the public at WIU's Malpass Library's Archives & Special Collections.

Instructor: John Hallwas is a retired archivist and author of many literary sources about the Illinois frontier, including Western Illinois Heritage.

Guided Tour of the Kibbe Museum in Carthage

This is one of the most enjoyable local museums in western Illinois. Well-known for its broad variety of exhibits, the museum features displays focused on farming, women's dresses, rural school education, toys, church history, various military experiences, technology (including a car manufactured in Hancock County), regional wildlife, Native American artifacts, and even some vanished local communities. The museum was named after Alice Kibbe, who was a professor and chair of the Biology Department at Carthage College. In recent years, the museum also developed a special Lincoln exhibit, featuring a log cabin, as well as aspects of his legal and political career.

Instructors: Keith Bruns is the head of the Hancock County Historical Society and a board member of the Kibbe Museum. John Hallwas has published many books and articles on the history of Hancock County and is president of the Illinois State Historical Society.

Instructors: Dr. Tim Roberts is a professor and chair of the History Department at WIU. He teaches and researches American history. Ron Pettigrew is the director of WIU's Veteran Resource Center, was a Navy Chaplain for 30 years, and has been an inner-city pastor for years.

Introduction to Meditation
